Our weekend in the village was a tiring one! Late nights, not much sleep, early mornings and constantly working at communicating in a different language and culture is tiring. None-the-less it was a wonderful opportunity to get to know people, to work side by side with the students and to talk about the Lord Jesus.

The student wives and I met with the women in the Presbyterian women's group. One of the student wives shared her testimony and we did a bible study together, on Matthew 5:8: "*Blessed are the pure in heart for they will see God.*"

The women as a whole were shocked to hear me suggest that I was not pure in heart and that neither were they and were *surprised by the grace* that means we can be sure we will see God.

During the conference, we learnt how to read a passage and understand the main argument of the author, how to preach or teach them and apply them to the people. We also learnt how to write a seminar for high school and to answer tough questions. After the conference we did mission with Springwood Anglican Church, which involved door-to-door knocking, engaging in different church activities and for leisure, sightseeing. We spent another week in Sydney mainly visiting churches and asking how they go about their ministry, especially in preparing their series of talks and preaching. We also visited Col Marshal who spoke about Ministry Training Strategy; and Moore College as well as other important places*. The three weeks were busy and worthwhile.

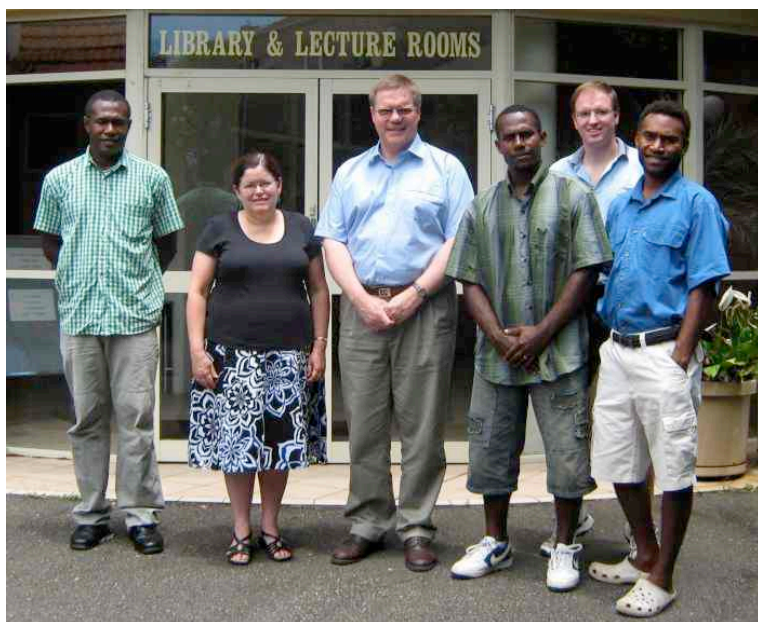
Actually, the three weeks were like my three years at my Ministry Training Centre. I learned preaching truthfully, faithfully and clearly from the Bible; Mission as part of being a disciple or apostle of Christ and practical pastoral ministry, how to make people grow in their faith in Christ. Not only that, but I also learned about different cultures, the difficulties in it and how different approaches work for mission and pastoral ministry in different contexts. Another helpful thing I've learned is that inward mission is very important, especially to people in my diocese and this I must emphasise strongly in my ministry. In short, I learnt more than I expected!

John Maite reflects on his experience....

- Australians are busy, using their time well.
- Australians are (according to my culture) confrontational.
- It was difficult to show love and care to strangers and only the older generations seemed hospitable and welcoming.
- I realised about how great the gap is between our countries in standards of Education and Health.
- I found that the driving force behind keeping our things is not need, but greed. This was what hurt me the most; how some parts of the world have nothing and some parts have everything but are not willing to give.
- Christians develop a loving, accepting and sharing environment among themselves.
- Church and ministries have a competitive mentality to challenge and transform Australian society with God's word.
- Churches and different ministries in Australia adjust and shape themselves to fit Australia as a multicultural nation.
- I learnt from the way churches organise themselves for ministry, mission and church programs.
- I was interested in how parents bring their children up, especially in how they discipline their children, time spent together, assessing children's behaviour and creating an environment that is suitable for growing young children.
- My prayer is that the relationship between our partners in Australia will continued to grow strong for the sake of the spread of the gospel of Jesus Christ.
